Wampum World: An Art Installation by Renée Ridgway

March 4–June 18, 2017

This multimedia exhibition is an artist's interpretation of the changing meaning of wampum from culture to culture and time period to time period. It combines the artist's video installations, watercolors, and collage works with objects that the artist has selected from the museum's collection of Dutch colonial materials. No physical wampum is shown in this exhibition.

Renée Ridgway is an artist, researcher, and educator based in Amsterdam, the Netherlands. Since completing her studies in fine art at the Rhode Island School of Design (BFA) and Piet Zwart Institute (MA), she has exhibited widely in the Netherlands and internationally at Manifesta8, P.S.1 MoMA Hotel New York, Centraal Museum Utrecht, Museum De Lakenhal, Gouda Museum, and Conflux Festival. Much of her work explores the Dutch colonial past and its contemporary repercussions through the transformation of "cultural currencies" such as wampum.




Spotlight: Erie Canal

March 25–August 20, 2017

To celebrate the 200th anniversary of the commencement of the Erie Canal, this exhibition features a selection of objects from the Institute's collection that visually narrates a broad history of the canal, beginning with a broadside from 1793 announcing the canal's predecessor, the Inland Lock and Navigation Company, to tourist guides from the twenty-first century. Other objects include a presentation silver ewer given to the owners of the ship *Mary and Hannah* for their shipment of wheat via the eastern half of the canal in 1823. Early drawings and paintings by James Eights and William Rickerby Miller show various locks and stretches of the canal across New York State. A commemorative token and souvenir book from the opening celebration in 1825

reveal the enthusiasm this engineering marvel generated. By the early twentieth century, attempts were made to widen and deepen the canal to accommodate larger barges in order to compete with the railroads. Today, the canal serves New York State primarily as a tourist attraction for bicyclists, hikers, and history buffs.

am thrilled that we will be honoring well-known community volunteer Ellen Jabbur at this year's Museum Gala.

Ellen is a long-time

supporter of the arts, including the AIHA. My earliest memories of Ellen involve contemporary art exhibitions and a wonderful lunch at her home. (Ellen is well known for her love of culinary arts too.)

As a volunteer, Ellen brings creative ideas and wonderful organizational skills to every project. Ellen first joined the Albany Institute Board of Trustees in 1994. She served as president of the Women's Council of the Albany Institute and chaired the popular Festival of Trees. In 1996, she also chaired the Gala's predecessor, the Museum Ball. When not volunteering, Ellen enjoys opera, music, and visiting museums and art galleries around the world.

A commitment to the arts was something her husband shared too. Dr. Munir T. Jabbur was a distinguished orthopedic surgeon. He trained in Beirut, Albany, and Boston and then he returned to Syria where he served as a solo doctor at the Danish Christian Mission Hospital for four years. Ellen, a retired nurse anesthetist, received her education in Denmark and the Berkshire Medical Center, Pittsfield, Massachusetts, They have two daughters, Rima Jabbur Macksoud, an artist and teacher who lives in Florida and Norma Jabbur, a linguist who lives in Beirut. In 2003, the museum celebrated the opening of the Jabbur Gallery, which was donated by Ellen and her husband, as part of the Heritage Campaign. Today, the Jabbur Galley is one of the most popular galleries; it houses part of the museum's Ancient Egyptian galleries. Dr. Jabbur passed away in 2012.

Hudson River School Opening July 8, 2017

The Albany Institute holds an internationally recognized collection of works by Hudson River School artists, including Thomas Cole, Frederic Edwin Church, Asher B. Durand, Jasper Cropsey, William and James Hart, and others. This long-term reinstallation will feature more than fifty paintings from the Institute's collection, which depict landscapes of the Hudson River Valley, New Hampshire's White Mountains, the coast of Maine, Lake George, and sites in Europe, along with landscapes from other regions of the United States.



The Fashionable Portrait Opening July 15, 2017

Over the centuries, portraits have offered interesting illustrations of the fashions and social customs of their times. The subjects of these paintings took care in selecting their clothing, accessories, and adornments. The artists of these paintings frequently took care to include intricate details of dress that reveal themselves upon close scrutiny—delicate lace trims, skilled

needlework, shimmering silk fabrics, and more.

This exhibition brings together a selection of paintings from the Institute's collection to provide a look at nineteenth century fashion as depicted in the work of portrait painters.

Well-Dressed in Victorian Albany: 19th Century Fashion from the Albany Institute Collection

Opening October 7, 2017

The upcoming fall exhibition of nineteenth-century Victorian fashion represents a rare opportunity to showcase part of the Albany Institute's costume collection, one of the museum's treasures. Spanning more than 250 years, from the mideighteenth century to the present, the Albany Institute's costume collection includes more than 4,000 garments and accessories that were used or worn by upstate New Yorkers of all ages, social classes, economic conditions, and cultural groups. Well-Dressed in Victorian Albany will focus on the clothing of the Victorian era—the years of Queen Victoria's reign



from 1837 to 1901.

The Victorian era has received renewed public interest with the recent first season of the PBS television series *Victoria*, which chronicles the life of the British monarch. Garments produced during this period reflect the wide-ranging impact of the Industrial Revolution on the aesthetics, technology, and social history of the time.

The featured costumes will include examples of garments worn in daily life and for life's special events; practical everyday styles will be juxtaposed with garments of incredible beauty and design. The decade by decade changes in fashion will be illustrated by the array of silhouettes created with bustles and hoops and elaborate sleeves. The luxury associated with the Victorian era will be reflected in the jewel rich tones and sumptuous textures found in the fabrics: plaid taffetas, plush velvets, and shimmering silk satins.







'Tute for Tots classes give children and adult companions a chance to discover the Albany Institute and the world of art together. In this program we'll explore the galleries, read stories, have a great time with





Albany-Nijmegen Partnership and Tulip Festival

Last fall, independent researcher Anja Adriaans gave a presentation at the Albany Institute about Albany's connection to the city of Nijmegen in the Netherlands. This story, rooted in World War II, was brought to life when she showed a long-lost film created in Nijmegen to thank the residents of Albany for their involvement in the war-relief effort in 1947. Her passion was infectious and attendees were curious to know more. They were fascinated to



discover that part of the official "thank you" to the city of Albany was a shipment of tulip bulbs that were planted and bloomed for the first Tulip Festival in 1949.

This fall will be the 70th anniversary of Albany-Nijmegen and the sister-city initiative. In anticipation of this milestone anniversary, Adriaans will return to Albany during the week of Tulip Festival to participate in various activities throughout the city and will also give a special presentation at the museum to reveal her newest research (see Calendar of Events section for more details).
