hardware distributor in Albany, NY. The collection contains administrative records,

photographs, catalogs, and scrapbooks. It contains many newspapers ads and articles on the

company and the men who ran it.

Biography/History of the Albany Hardware and Iron Company

The Albany Hardware and Iron Company can be traced back to the year 1797. Samuel Hill received a land grant in the 1790s on 39-43 State Street, the first home of the Albany Hardware and Iron Company. This was the location of its retail division. Mr. Hill called his business The *Sign of the Golden Hinge*. The Store passed down to different owners over the years, the Pruyn family, then Maurice Viele. Eventually, in 1913, the company consolidated to form Albany Hardware and Iron Company. The Company had a long history of promoting from within. Many of the Board and higher positions were filled from employees moving up in the

company. A warehouse facility was located on Dallius Street, but eventually, with growing demand for products, in the 1926, a new site was found, near the river, at Broadway and Arch Streets. Today, it is the home of U-HAUL. Beginning in the 1950s, discount stores came into fashion, and changed the way business was done. Soon, there was no room for wholesale businesses, as retailers were now buying from co-ops. This forced the shutdown of the retail division of Albany Hardware and Iron Co. at 41 State Street in 1960. The next five years yielded losses. There seemed to be no end in sight. In 1966, a special meeting of the Stockholders voted for dissolution of the company. In 1967, the properties and bills were settled. The donor, Don Eberle, the company's last secretary and board member, was put in charge of liquidating assets.

Scope and Contents of the Records

There are four series in this collection: The Administrative Files, Photographs, Catalogs, and Scrapbooks. The records cover the history of the business from its incorporation in 1891 until its sale and dissolution in 1967. The records consist of stock certificates; board meeting minutes, correspondence with stockholders, catalogs, advertisements, photographs and scrapbooks. The scrapbooks contain newspaper articles, correspondence and photographs. There are also some documents that tell of the local events, in photographs and in programs. Through these records, the lives of some its past presidents are revealed. Newspaper biographies reveal the hiring policy of promoting from within. In this collection, documentation on the rental, building and expanding of a parking lot on Dallius Street is provided. There is much documentation on the building and opening of the new warehouse location on Broadway and Arch Streets.

The earliest piece in the collection is a photographic reprint of a bill of sale from Samuel Hill in 1797. The newest item is a newspaper article from 1986 describing events that had been covered in the past by that newspaper, in this case, the Albany Hardware and Iron Co. Most of the material falls into one of three ranges: 1891, stocks, newspapers, scrapbooks, some administrative files; 1920s-1930s, most of the photographs seem to date to this period; and 1963-66, proxies, real estate, board meetings, and other administrative files relating the dissolution of the company.

Organization of the Records

The Collection is organized into four series:

Administrative Files: Series one. It contains files relating to the legal and business aspects of Albany Hardware and Iron Co. This series contains the by-laws, incorporation papers, stock certificates, board meeting minutes, correspondence, proxy voting and newspaper ads not found in the scrapbooks. This series details how the business was run. A folder containing newspaper ads from 1895, 1927, and unknown are is not in box 1 because it is oversized so it is found in box 7.

Photographs and Drawings: Series two. It contains photographs and drawings of the business and its customers and employees. The pictures are in different sizes and from different time periods. Most of the pictures are from the 1920s-1930s. One folder contains photographs removed from old picture frames. These frames were thrown away due to their poor quality and condition. There is also a drawing done in pencil of the new warehouse building. Other categories include warehouse photos, retail store photos, board and employee pictures, and different Albany events.

Catalogs: Series three. It contains seven catalogs from the Albany Hardware and Iron Co. Two catalogs are identical, save for the inscribed name on the fronts. One belonged to Wm. I. Baker; the other belonged to Jasper K. Dunscomb. There is also a Toy catalog, and a copy of a newsmagazine/catalog published by Albany Hardware and Iron Co. A wholesale catalog and a hardware supplies catalog are included. Finally, this series also houses William Dearstyne's Warehouse Data Notebook, which contains handwritten notes on warehouse stock.

Scrapbooks: Series four. It contains three different scrapbooks. One, W.I. Baker's Scrapbook, is in three boxes; one of these boxes is oversized and is shared with the records from series one. The oversized material has the page number it was taken from labeled on the back. All three are labeled as part of this collection and this series. The other two scrapbooks each have their own box. In each case, the items from the inside front and back covers were removed to acid free folders placed in each box. Also, newspaper articles and ads were preservation photocopied whenever possible. The original newspapers clippings are in the inside cover of the oversize scrapbook. One scrapbook is a book marked *Invoices*. This contains news clippings, correspondence and other miscellaneous papers. The third scrapbook is unnamed. This contains material largely relating to the opening and building of the new warehouse building on Broadway and Arch Streets in the 1920s.

Preservation Notes

Newspaper articles and clippings were photocopied onto acid free paper whenever possible, omitting those that were too big, glued into scrapbooks, or were too fragile for use on the copier. The W.I Baker scrapbook contents were taken out of the book and put into acid free folders. Some of the newspaper clipping originals were copied then thrown away since those were to destroyed to save. The contents of the book were put into the acid free folders according to page number. The items in the scrapbooks are left largely as they are found, with few exceptions. The papers will remain glued or stapled or stuck in the pages of the books. Some fragile documents have been sleeved for their protection. The photographs have been sleeved or placed between acid free sheets. The photographs in the picture frames have been removed from the frames and placed in acid free folders in series 2. All staples, pins and fasteners have been removed from the documents. Everything is placed in acid free folder and boxes.

Related Material
