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2014 EXHIBITION BY ARTISTS OF THE MOHAWK-HUDSON REGION AWARD WINNERS ANNOUNCED

Opening reception Friday, September 26 from 5PM-8PM Exhibition will run from September 27, 2014—January 19, 2015

ALBANY, NY— The 2014 Exhibition by Artists of the Mohawk-Hudson Region is now open at the Albany Institute of History & Art in Albany, New York. It showcases 142 works by 75 artists who live within a 100-mile radius of Albany or Glens Falls.

A record 278 artists working within a 100-mile radius of the Capital District and Glens Falls submitted paintings, sculptures, video, installations, photographs, prints, and mixed media for consideration in the exhibition and the finalists were selected by this year's juror, Stephen Westfall. Westfall, an internationally known painter, writer, and professor of art, enthusiastically embraced the opportunity to review this year's submissions and select the final show. His passion for looking at art was palpable, as was his critical eye for originality of ideas, materials, and techniques. Westfall also arranged the work in the galleries, creating mindful juxtapositions and surprising adjacencies.

Of the 142 works, twenty-five were recognized with awards. The three host institutions each offer Purchase Awards and select those pieces for their collections. The juror also chooses cash awards and gift certificate winners, which are sponsored by area businesses and art patrons. This year's winners are listed below:

The regional exhibition travels among the Albany Institute of History & Art, the University Art Museum at the University at Albany, and The Hyde in Glens Falls. Established in 1936, this annual, juried exhibition pays tribute to the many talented artists working within a 100-mile radius of the Capital District and Glens Falls. As one of the longest-running regional art exhibitions in the country, it occupies a significant role in documenting contemporary art activity in the Upper Hudson Valley. Sponsoring institutions include these hosts as well as Albany Center Gallery.

The exhibition will run from September 27, 2014 through January 19, 2015. The museum will host artist talks as part of 1st Friday Albany at 6PM on November 7, December 5, and January 2. MORE ABOUT THE JUROR:

This year's juror is Stephen Westfall, an internationally-known painter, writer, and professor. Westfall exhibits his work in the United States and Europe. Recent exhibitions include kunstgaleriebonn, Germany; Lennon Weinberg Gallery, New York; George Lawson Gallery, San Francisco; Galerie Lock, St. Gallen (Switzerland); Galerie Paal, Munich; Galerie Zürcher, Paris. Currently, works by Westfall are on view at Omi International Art Center, Ghent, New York. Reviews of his work have appeared in Time Out New York, New York Times, Art in America, New Criterion, Partisan Review, and L'Express. Public collections include Albertina Museum, Vienna; Baltimore Museum of Art; Humlebæk, Denmark; Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art, Kansas City; Louisiana Museum of Modern Art, Louisiana; Munson-Williams-Proctor Art Institute, Utica; Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; Museum of Modern Art, New York; and the Whitney Museum, New York. Westfall has received numerous awards including a Rome Prize Fellowship (2009-10), Guggenheim Foundation Fellowship (2007), Nancy Graves Grant for Visual Artists (2006); two awards from American Academy of Arts and Letters; three fellowships from National Endowment for the Arts; and two fellowships from New York State Council on the Arts. His writing has been published in Art in America, Arts Magazine, Flash Art, Time Out New York, New York Times, New Criterion, Partisan Review, and L'Express. Westfall is an Associate Professor and Graduate Director at The Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University, and Painting Co-Chair at The Milton Avery Graduate School of the Arts at Bard College. He recently

served as the Jules Guerin/John Armstrong Chaloner Rome Prize Fellow in Visual Arts at the American Academy. Stephen Van Rensselaer Westfall was born in Schenectady, New York; his family settled in the Hudson Valley in the early eighteenth century. Westfall received his BA. and M.F.A. from the University of California, Santa Barbara and is represented by Lennon Weinberg Gallery, New York.

Founded in 1791, the Albany Institute of History & Art is New York's oldest museum. Its collections document the Hudson Valley as a crossroads of culture, influencing the art and history of the region, the state, and the nation. Among the museum's best-known and most-loved collections are the 19th century Hudson River School landscape paintings by artists like Thomas Cole and Frederic Church, the 19th century sculpture collections, and, of course, the famous Albany Mummies that came to the museum in 1909 and have been on view ever since.
