ALBANY MUSEUM TO HOST FESTIVE, FUN, AND FREE THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

ALBANY, NEW YORK- The Albany Institute of History & Art will be decorated and ready to welcome locals and out-of-area guests to the museum for their "Home for the Holidays" event this Thanksgiving weekend. The museum, which in the past has hosted holiday-themed events such as the beloved Festival of Trees, is rekindling that holiday spirit with a three-day extravaganza of holiday programs, specialty vendors, and of course, trees. Home for the Holidays is sponsored by Times Union.

"Whenever I'm in the community and talking with people from the area, they speak fondly of the Festival of Trees," says the museum's Executive Director Tammis Groft. "Home for the Holidays will have that seasonal flair, plus lots of great activities, shopping opportunities, and time to visit with family and friends. Thanksgiving weekend is a time when people want something fun and festive to do and we invite everyone to enjoy the start of the holiday season at the museum."

Visitors can see trees decorated by community members, purchase ornaments from a special tree decorated by artists from this year's Exhibition by Artists of the Mohawk-Hudson Region, and make their own ornaments in the art studio. They can also go on guided gallery tours and view the results of the museum's Quilt Wall Hanging Challenge. People will be able to take the time to enjoy the Victorian charm of the museum's historic Rice House, one of the last intact Beaux Arts mansions in Albany. It will have decorated mantles, holiday trees, and seasonal displays- a perfect backdrop for photos with family and friends.

Some of the special activities happening at Home for the Holidays include: Saint Nicholas and a live reindeer on Friday; needlework demonstrations by the Capital District Chapter of the Embroiderer's Guild of America on Friday and Saturday; lecture and book signing by food historian Peter Rose on Sunday; and a miniature hooked rug demonstration on Sunday.

Its collections document the Hudson Valley as a crossroads of culture, influencing the art and history of the region, the state, and the nation. With more than 35,000 objects and one million documents in the library, it is an important resource for the region, giving our community a sense of the part the Hudson Valley played in the American story, and our own place in history. Permanent and temporary exhibitions are open year-round and create a sense of place, allowing visitors to meet the people who helped shape this region. Over 25,000 people visit the Albany Institute of History & Art every year, enjoying the collections, workshops, school programs, and lectures, helping to build an understanding of the history and culture of our region. Among the museum's best-known and most-loved collections are the 19th century Hudson River School landscape paintings by artists like Thomas Cole and Frederic Church, the 19th century sculpture collections, and, of course, the famous Albany Mummies that came to the museum in 1909 and have been on view ever since.
