# **Biography of John Mason Clarke**

John Mason Clarke was born in Canadaguia, New York, the son of Dr. Noah Clarke, headmaster of the Canadaguia Academy and from a family that migrated to Central New York from Peru, in Berkshire County Massachusetts.

He was the Director of the New York State Museum from 1904 until his death in 1925. He was a geologist by trade, having worked for the state at the time of his directorship. During his tenure as director, he broadened the scope of the museum, opening it up to a broader range of sciences. He also began a study of the economic resources of the museum. It was him who helped acquire geologically significant state lands such as pieces of John Boyd Thacher Park, Green Lakes State Park in Syracuse, and the Chittenango Falls Park.

Mr. Clarke was a highly educated man. He attended university in Germany, at Gottingen University. He also attended Amherst College in Massachusetts. He spoke four languages, at least, judging from his correspondence, French, German, Greek and English. He was also president of the Albany Institute of History and Art.

# **Scope and Contents of the Records**

The collection contains letters he wrote to family and friends while a student at Gottingen University in 1883-84, as well as family and personal correspondence from 1908-24. Some of this material is in French and German. The collection also contains professional correspondence, most noticeably about the Cohoes mastodon from 1908-25. There are several diaries in the collection, written partially in Greek. There is also a autobiography that Clarke started. Ida May Bell's correspondence with her future husband, Willis Winne and her uncle John Bell's Civil War letters are included as well. It is unclear what relationship these people had to Mr. Clarke or the New York State Museum.

## **Organization of the Records**

The records are arranged in three boxes, with no series. **Box 1** contains Mr. Clarke's personal correspondence, including his time in Germany, his autobiography, and obituary. **Box 2** contains foreign correspondence, and professional correspondence, as well as clippings and notes relating to the New York State Museum. This box also contains the correspondence of Ida May Bell and her husband and uncle. **Box 3** contains the diaries of Mr. Clarke.
