ALBANY INSTITUTE TO HOST EGYPTOLOGIST SALIMA IKRAM FOR LECTURE ON MUMMIFYING ANIMALS IN ANCIENT EGYPT

Part of GE Presents: The Mystery of the Albany Mummies Lecture Series

ALBANY, NY – On Friday, April 11, 2014, Salima Ikram, Egyptology Unit Head and Professor of Egyptology at the American University Cairo, will present a lecture in conjunction with the GE Presents: The Mystery of the Albany Mummies exhibition. Ikram will present the different types of animal mummies (food, pets, votive offerings, sacred creatures) and explain how they were made, the reasons for making them, as well as the theological and aesthetic decisions that went into their "packaging." She will also discuss how animal mummies reflect the ways in which the ancient Egyptians interacted with the animal world, and how they influence our views of the ancient Egyptians. This lecture will take place at the Albany Institute at 6PM and is free with museum admission. The museum galleries will be open from 10AM-6PM on Friday, April 11 to accommodate lecture attendees. Space is limited and guests are asked to arrive early and secure their seat by getting a ticket at the front desk.

Salima Ikram is one of the world's leading experts on animal mummies. She is the founder and codirector of the Animal Mummy project at the Egyptian Museum in Cairo. She has written several books, including Divine Creatures which is available for sale in the Albany Institute's Museum Shop. She has also been featured in television programs focused on ancient Egypt, including Da Vinci Code: Decoded (Channel 4 UK) and Tomb Raiders: Robbing the Dead (History Channel). She has served as a visiting scholar at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City and as a consultant Egyptologist at Giza, Abu Sir, Valley of the Kings, and other sites.

GE Presents: The Mystery of the Albany Mummies Lecture Series features archaeologists, curators, and scholars from around the world who will share their insights into ancient Egyptian life, art, and funerary practices, as well as recent scientific revelations about the Albany mummies. This new information includes CT-scans and X-rays done by Albany Medical Center in 2012. The last speaker of the series will be Violaine Chauvet, a lecturer in Egyptology at the University of Liverpool on Sunday,

April 13, 2014 at 2PM. The lecture will take place at the Albany Institute of History & Art and her topic is "Tanis and Karnak: Temples in the 21st Dynasty." It is free with museum admission.
